#### Research Tips:

Search online catalogs first to identify call numbers or digital copies.

1. Use finding-aids and inventories (often PDFs linked on these pages) to pinpoint specific series.
2. Contact archivists or reference librarians at each institution to assist with specialized queries (e.g., “daily account books,” “crew muster rolls,” “bills of lading”).
3. Leverage interlibrary loan or reproduction services for remote access to microfilm or digitized facsimiles.
